<u>Preside</u>nt

- Lead the group throughout the entire meeting
- Choose volunteers to lead the Pledge of Allegiance and 4-H Pledge
- Keep order in the class
- Be prepared and make sure all officers are ready and prepared

Vice President

- Be in charge of the meeting if the president is absent
- Give the "Thought of the Day"
- Be prepared and work with the president to make the meeting run smoothly

<u>Secretary</u>

- Take accurate minutes (notes) of all aspects of the 4-H meeting. You should write down everything that is discussed while the meeting is taking place, not when you get home. Everything, from the time the meeting begins, until the time the meeting is adjourned, should be documented in the secretary's book
- Read minutes at the appropriate time during the meeting
- Be prepared with pencil and secretary's book

- Report on activities going on in school
- Keep participation chart up to date

For example Sally will now lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance", then say, "Please stand for the American Pledge and remain standing for the 4-H Pledge'

<u>Vice-President</u> "*I will now read the thought of the day* or introduce the name of the person who will be reading].

President "The secretary will read the minutes from the last meeting

<u>Secretary</u>: Read minutes from the secretary's book.

President "The reporter will now give the Club report

<u>Reporter</u>: Presents report on activities in club and projects.



President "The reporter will now update the participation chart

<u>Reporter</u>: [Update the chart by giving check marks to those 4-H members who have participated in the contest for the month].

President: "If there is no further business, I will end the business part of the meeting and turn the meeting over to our 4-H Agent."

- 4-H State Congress (Murfreesboro, March 9 12, 2025) state Congress is an invitational event for 4-H'ers in grades 9 - 12 who have been selected as a state finalist after submitting their Leadership or Citizenship portfolio or as a Regional Public Speaking winner. 4-H'ers in grades 9 & 10 may also attend as a Senator or Representative if they are selected after submitting an essay on the current year's Congress theme.
- 4-H State Roundup & All-Star Conference (UT Knoxville, July 21- 25, 2025) tate Roundup is an invitational event where 4-H'ers in grades 9 12, who have submitted their project portfolio, have been recognized as a regional winner within their project.
- Southern Region Teen Leadership Conference (Crossville, September 19-23, 2025): SRTLC is for youth who are *ages 14 - 18*. It is a multi-day, multi-state conference where 4-H teens can come together to share and learn ways to make a positive change and impact all across the Southern Region. The conference is a terrific networking opportunity!
- Target S.M.A.R.T. Camp (Crossville, May 26 30, 2025)Target SMART Camp is for 4-H'ers enrolled in grades 5 - 12 who are interested in our Shooting Sports Program. Camp offers youth the opportunity to learn appropriate skills to succeed in a variety of shooting sports and related areas such as archery, riflery, shotgunning, muzzle loading and outdoor skills. Programs emphasize safety, correct posture, form and responsible use.
- Honor Club (1st Tuesday / month): This group are designed for youth in grades 6 12 who wish to participate in service-learning opportunities and build their leadership and citizenship skills. They also help to open the doorway to many regional, state and national events and opportunities through direct contact with the 4-H & Extension Office.
- State Honor Club: State Honor Club is a continuation of the Honor Club. Once 4-H'ers accumulate 200 points, they can submit their State Honor Club application to the 4-H Office, and once approved, they will be sent to the state for recognition.
- All-Stars: Once an Honor Club member has completed the 8th Grade and has been an active State Honor Club Member for at least one year, they may apply to become an All Star. Other perks include invitations to the annual Spring and Fall All Star retreats throughout the state.
- Vol State: Once an active All Star has completed the 10th Grade, they may become an eligible candidate to receive the Vol State award. Vol State gives deserved recognition to 4-H'ers who have particularly outstanding records in project achievement, leadership and service in 4-H.

- 4-H'ers will create a poster which PROMOTES 4-H to others. The "Top 3" posters in the county will advance to the regional competition. Yes, CLOVERBUDS are welcome!
- **Digital Marketing Category.** The same regular poster contest rules apply and digital entries must be submitted as a PDF file to one of the agents with "Digital Poster Art Contest Entry" as the subject line.

GUIDELINES:


- While brainstorming, imagine signs, billboards and advertisements. Start with a simple, catchy idea and create a slogan for the theme of your poster.
- Use your space wisely. Before marking on your poster board, lightly sketch out designs with a pencil and lay letters down before permanently gluing them so you can adjust your space correctly.
- Any color poster board may be used. Choose colors wisely by using a color wheel to help choose colors which complement each other.
- Simple, block-style letters are easier to read than cursive or script letters. Letters that are cut using a letter-cutter or cut from construction paper look neater than drawing letters on your board. Make sure letters are large enough that they can be seen from several feet away.

RULES:

- Your poster must promote 4-H and include the 4-H emblem (when using the 4-H emblem on your poster, please follow criteria specified by the national guidelines regarding use of the 4-H emblem or contact the office).
 ⇒ Do not obscure or place text & other images (photos, drawings, symbols) over or on top of the 4-H Emblem.
 ⇒ Use only official colors. The clover stem should turn to the right only and the clover should not be slanted.
- Posters must be 22" x 14" (length x height) horizontal oriented (landscape, 22" left to right, 14" top to bottom).

Horizontal

- 4-H'ers Name, Address, County, Age, Grade & email address should be on the back in the upper right corner.
- The word: "4-H" as well as the 4-H "Clover" 👫 must be included in your poster (See images right below).
- Design must be original and relate to the theme.



• Do not copy a slogan such as "Beef, It's What's for Dinner", "Just Do It" or "May the Force be with You".

4-H'ers (Grades 4 - 12) will deliver a timed, prepared speech to a panel of judges. All 1st Place winners will eligible to advance to the Western Regional Competition (Grades 9 - 12) or the Southwest Area Sub-Reg Competition (Grades 4 - 8).

GUIDELINES:

Speeches are made up of three parts: Introduction, Body, Conclusion

Introduction—start your speech with a question or a catchy phrase, tell your audience what you will be speaking about.

Body—this contains the different points you'd like to talk about. You should include at least 3 points. Conclusion—end your speech with a poem, neat fact, catchy phrase again or a related joke. Don't forget t remind them of the purpose of your speech's main topic.

RULES:

4th Grade: 1 ~ 2 minutes 5th Grade: 2 ~ 3 minutes 6th Grade: 3 ~ 4 minutes 7th Grade: 4 ~ 5 minutes 8th Grade: 4 ~ 5 minutes

9th Grade: 5 ~ 7 minutes 10th Grade: 5 ~ 7 minutes

11th Grade: 5 ~ 7 minutes 12th Grade: 5 ~ 7 minutes 4th—8th Grade: You may choose your own topic. Examples such as: "My favorite <u>.", "A</u> person you admire.", "A subject or topic you are learning about in school." **Note cards may be used, but NO vis**

9th—12th Grade: All speeches must relate in some way to the 4-H member's experience in 4-H as well as something learned. It should also promote 4-H.

11th—12th Grade: In addition to the regular 4-H speech, 11th and 12th Grade 4-H'ers will be expected to deliver an extemporaneous or impromptu speech.

Speakers will be expected to dress appropriately.

Girls: suit, dress, nice top, modest skirt or pants, hair should be pulled away from face.

Boys: suit; khaki or dark dress slacks; nice, buttoned, collared shirt (polo or full button-down); tie (optional) ABSOLUTELY NO: jeans (blue or any color), athletic wear, action wear, t-shirts, hoodies, sweatshirts, head covering (hats, caps, beanies, doo-rags, bandanas...), shorts or open-toed shoes including flip-flips and sandals.

County Public Speaking Contest (Continued...)

EXPLANATION of Judging Criteria and Points

Speaker

Appearance: As the speaker approaches the lectern and throughout the presentation, is their posture good; do they stand solidly on the floor; are their clothes (does not matter whether or not they are new or fashionable) clean and pressed? Does the speaker sway from one foot to another; lean on the lectern or table; slump and show poor grooming? A perfect score for this category is 10 points.

Language: Is it understandable, pleasing, meaningful, vivid and properly announced with proper grammar? Scores may range from 0 to 20.

Projection / Voice: Do they have eye contact with the audience? Does the presentation have sufficient volume? Is it clear, distinct and presented with expression and enthusiasm? Does the speaker instead present a memorized or read report? Do they communicate? Scores may range from 0 to 10.

Preparation: Whether or not the speaker occasionally refers to notes, do they seem to be well prepared? Do they read the speech, stumble over words or thoughts, or lack preparation (whether notes or memory) to carry through the presentation? Scores may vary between 0 and 15.

Subject Matter and Composition

Organization: Do ideas center around a central theme in a logical order, easily followed and understood by listeners? Does the speech seem poorly organized with random ideas or with ideas which do not fit into the theme? Points may range from 0 to 10 here.

Sources: Is the information accurate? Is the topic narrow enough for the message to be given completely? Has the speaker earned the right to speak on the subject through study and experience (preferably in 4-H)? Is the information current? Is the information seemingly out-of-date, too broad to be covered completely or incorrect? From 0 to 10 points are possible here.

Introduction, Summary and Conclusion:Does the introduction catch the interest of the audience while presenting the theme for the entire speech? Speakers should NOT begin by giving their name and club or by recognizing the "honorable judges, ladies and gentlemen, etc." Does the summary tie the important points of the speech to the theme in an interesting way that makes you remember the speech? Does the speech have no real introduction or perhaps an inadequate introduction or summary? Points will vary from 0 to 10 in this category with half the scoring for the introduction and half for the summary.

5 points will be deducted for being under the minimum time. 1 point Time Penalties:

will be deducted for every 30 seconds a speech exceeds the maximum time limit.

Tie-Breaker: To break a tie use, the "Use of Language" score from the score card will be used.

County Photography Contest

4-H'ers will submit photographs in 6 categories to be judged by a panel of judges. Yes, **CLOVERBUDS** are welcome!

GUIDELINES:

If you print your photos at home, be sure to use a high-quality photo paper.

Photos may be in color, black & white (B&W) and sepia.

Grading of the photos will be conducted by a panel of judges.

Photos will be judged based upon the subject or content, exposure and clarity of the photo.

RULES:

You may use any type of camera you'd like, but digital cameras or cellphones / tablets are often easier and more convenient to use.

Maximum photo size should not exceed 5" x 7".

Every photo entry must have a completed entry form filled out and TAPED to the back of each photo NOT use glue to attach photo entry forms.

Only ONE entry per category is allowed, however, you may enter all 6 categories.

Entries may be comprised of a **SINGLE** entry or a **SERIES**.

A series must consist of 4 photos showing a "before and after" or a "how-to" theme.

A series entry must have the 4 photos numbered sequentially or in order of events in addition to entry forms on each photo in the series.

Place all entries from an individual 4-H'er in one envelope with NAME, ADDRESS, CITY, STATE, ZIP CODE, GRADE, SCHOOL / CLUB NAME and TEACHER / LEADER NAME.

STATE PHOTO SEARCH CONTEST:

Grades 7 - 12: The top 10 photos will be mailed to the State Office in Knoxville and entered into the Tennessee 4-H State Photo Search Contest. These photos MUST relate to 4-H in some way in order to be eligible for the State Photo Search Contest.

4-H'ers will create and submit their very own Piggy Bank to help promote the importance of financial education and being prepared for the future. Yes, CLOVERBUDS are welcome!

GUIDELINES:

Create a Piggy Bank that is unique and has personality. Give your Piggy Bank a theme! It can reflect your own personality.

Your Piggy Bank does not have to be a traditional pig; it can be ANYTHING, such as a princess pig, clock, barn, camo.

You may construct your piggy bank from items such as paper, milk cartons, coffee cans and just about anything that will help make your Piggy Bank unique. You may decorate your Piggy Bank with paint, sequins, glitter and anything that will help its uniqueness.

Be sure your Piggy Bank is able to be transported without falling apart; nothing fragile.

RULES:

Piggy Banks must be NO larger than 12" x 12" x "12".

Piggy Banks must NOT be created with or include GLASS.

Piggy Banks should be made to be travelable and portable, again, nothing fragile or anything that could fall apart.

Do not turn your Piggy Bank in with money or currency in it.

The Piggy Bank Entry Form must be taped to the **BOTTOM** of your Piggy Bank. Entry forms are found in the back of this yearbook.

STATE PIGGY BANK PAGEANT:

All 1st Place winners in each grade level will be entered into the State Piggy Bank Pageant. This contest is different than the local county contest. Piggy Banks must be received into the Extension Office by the regular county deadline.

Theme: "Agriculture: Together We Grow" This is an opportunity for students to learn about Agriculture. The theme "Agriculture: Together We Grow" celebrates how everyone plays a part in making agriculture strong—farmers, communities, businesses, and consumers. It reminds us that by working together, we can help feed and support people all over the world. Whether it's using new technology, taking care of the environment, or sharing knowledge, we can all help grow a better future. This theme shows how teamwork and unity are essential to making agriculture thrive and succeed. Have the students consider "How has agriculture impacted their lives and how it can in the future." Some topics to discuss with the students to help with ideas about the theme are how corn and soybeans are used to fuel our cars, fresh fruits and vegetables power our bodies, and technology such as drones are advancing agriculture. Art entries are due to Agricenter International by close of business March 7, 2025. There are cash prizes for both winning students and TEACHERS of 1st place winning students.

2025 Theme: Agriculture: Together We Grow

ELIGIBILITY: Any 3rd – 12th grade public, private, and homeschool student enrolled in Shelby, Tipton, and Fayette Counties in TN, Crittenden County, AR and Desoto County in MS schools. Students may develop an entry inside or outside of school. Students are eligible to submit one entry in each contest category.

ART CATEGORIES: There are five categories that students can enter. There is no limit to the number of art pieces submitted per school.

<u> 5 Categories:</u>

- 1. Drawing
- 2. Photography
- 3. Painting
- 4. Graphic Design
- 5. Short Video

All submissions must be original art designed by the student. Any work that is not will be disqualified.

Drawing and Painting art submission guidelines: Traditional media categories include Drawing, Painting and Collage. Original work must not exceed 11 X 14 inches.

Photography submission guidelines: Photography work includes color or black and white on 8.5" X 11" photo paper. Please do NOT frame or mount photography submissions. Photographs must be taken by the student and associated with the theme.

Graphic design submission guidelines: Graphic design work must be developed by original media and is defined as the use of computer media and innovative computer applications to art. Original artwork must be 8.5" X 11". Please do NOT mat graphic design work.

Short video submission guidelines: Video entries should be between30 seconds and 3 minutes. Videos over 3 minutes will not be considered. Video quality should be 1080p or higher. Videos can be turned in on a jump drive or a link to the video can be emailed to: <u>tim.roberts@utk.edu</u> or <u>krav@utk.edu</u>.

GRADE DIVISIONS:

Division 1: 3rd-6th Grades Division 2: 7th-9th Grades Division 3: 10th-12th Grades

Judging Criteria Considered:

Art entries will be judged on the following: interpretation of concept, uniqueness, artistry, and artist statement. The Artist Statement should include: what inspired the work, how it relates to the theme, and the content of the work in at least three sentences.

PRIZES:

The decision of the judges will be final. Students do not need to be present to win. **Student Prizes:**

ART ENTRY REQUIREMENTS:

- Submissions should be new pieces of artwork that reflect the current year's theme.
- Each entry must be the original work of one student only. Only one student may be recognized as the award recipient for each entry. An adult may not alter the integrity of a student's work. Help from an adult or collaboration with other students is not allowed. Children of sponsors are not eligible.
- All artwork must include complete entries containing an artist statement and an entry form found below. Please attach the statement and entry form to the back of entries. Video entry statements and entry forms may be submitted via title screen in video or typed on paper and submitted with USB drive loaded with video or emailed with video link.
- The entry form includes: the name of student entrant, age, grade level, name of school, names of parent or guardian and their complete mailing address with zip code, telephone number, and the full name of the art teacher or home room teacher and teacher's email the artwork was created in.
- Entries must be accompanied by an "Artist's Statement" of at least three sentences but no more than 200 words that is created by the student entrant. The artists statement communicates what inspired the work, how it relates to the theme, and the content of the work.
- Use of copyrighted material (images) or trademarks (company names, logos, brands, etc.) is prohibited except for background music in video production entries. If used in video production entries, background music must be cited on the entry form. Plagiarized entries will be disqualified. Use of PowerPoint templates are prohibited.
- Entries must comply with all local and national laws of the United States. Content must not 1) promote illegal behavior; 2) support racial, religious, sexual or other invidious prejudice; 3) advocate sexual or violent exploitation; 4) violate rights established by law or agreements; 5) invade the privacy of any person; or 6) be otherwise inappropriate as determined by Agricenter in its sole and conclusive determination.

Student may only submit piece of artwork

within each of the art categories. Any violation of these rules may, at the Agricenter's discretion, result in disqualification. 

Project Showcase is similar to the Public Speaking Contest, but you may have a VISIAL AID!!! You may use a tri-fold display board, just as you would in a school science fair.



Participants will be expected to dress appropriately.

Girls: suit, dress, nice top, modest skirt or pants, hair should be pulled away from face. Boys: suit; khaki or dark dress slacks; nice, buttoned, collared shirt (polo or full button-down); tie (optional)

ABSOLUTELY NO: jeans (blue or any color), athletic wear, action wear, t-shirts, hoodies, sweatshirts,

head covering (hats, caps, beanies, doo-rags, bandanas...), shorts, flip-flips, sandals, open toe shoes.

Explanation

Demonstrator(15 Points possible)

- Appearance: Neat / clean. Posture. No distracting jewelry. Hair out of eyes. No gum. Well-groomed. (5 Points)
- Voice: Is it pleasing, clear and distinct with correct grammar? (5 Points)
- Poise and enthusiasm: Good voice projection. Good eye-contact with the audience and judges. Smiles. Appears calm and collected. (5 Points)

Presentation(50 Points possible)

- Introduction: Is it attention-getting, giving the purpose of the demonstration; brief and important; telling what is to be done; or is it just the opposite, merely repetition of the demonstrator's name and club when he/she has already been introduced? (10 Points)
- Main points clearly stated: Are all the steps clearly seen and can be understood by the audience? Are the points easily distinguished? (10 Points)
- Summary: Is it interesting and short, but complete; key points re-emphasized; no new material introduced; purpose met? If gestures are used, are they natural? (10 Points)
- Demonstration given convincingly: Does it seem the 4-H'er has knowledge of the subject and does not read his/her information? (5 Points)
- Equipment / Visuals: Is it well-selected and organized; work area clearly seen; suitable and effective equipment for the job; equipment handled with ease; arranged for efficient use; used as needed; without name brands or labels? Are they neat, clear, well-illustrated; used to amplify, not duplicate methods shown; charts not too crowded; simple designs; only needed charts used; charts handled smoothly? (10 Points)

Work area: Is it left neat or as it was before the demonstration? (5 Points)

Subject Matter (35 Points possible)

Selection and organization: Is it presented in logical sequence with only one theme or idea presented; subject narrow enough to be covered adequately? Is topic related to the 4-H project? (10 Points)

Source of information: Is it accurate and up-to-date; selected from reliable information from USDA or

UT Extension recommended practices; personal experience can be cited; source of information can be cited; suited to age, interest and experience of the demonstrator? (15 Points)

Practical questions: Are they answered accurately; 4-H'er admits not knowing answer instead of guessing; subject adequately covered enough there is no need for additional questions? (10 Points)

Tips for Planning Your Project Showcase

***Be sure to choose a topic that interests you.

Visual Aids

Colors

Dark backgrounds, yellow letters are easy to read. White backgrounds with dark letters are attractive. Avoid using bright background with bright letters. Choose colors that are easy to read.

Organization

Begin with an introduction. Discuss main points & objectives. Summarize your main points in your conclusion. Explain each step. Visual aids are an important part of the demonstration. Special attention should be given to each visual. List everything you need for your demonstration. List each step. Briefly summarize your conclusions.

Writing

Use large lettering you can see from the back row. Block letters are easier to read than cursive. Capitalize only when necessary.


